The right words communicate subtle nuances in addition to the obvious message. But we can also arrive at misunderstandings through words as well. Consider a popular expression which Christians use at Easter (you'll likely hear it this weekend if you attend a church service): "*He is risen.*" To which the reply is, "*He is risen indeed.*"

It's worth noting the language the New Testament writers used when describing the resurrection. They often describe how Jesus was *raised* to life. Depending on the context, it might read as "be raised," (Mt. 16:21, 20:19; Lk. 9:22, 24:7) "was raised," (Jn. 2:22, 21:14) "been raised" (Mt 17:9, 27:64), or specifically that "God raised" (Acts 2:24, 2:32, 3:15, 3:26, 4:10, 5:30, 10:40, 13:30, 13:34, 13:37). Those are just the examples through the book of Acts.

The point is that Jesus didn't do it Himself. We might imagine Jesus naturally rising from the dead on His own timing and power. Like it was the inevitable reaction to His dead body lying there for three days. "Oh look, He is risen!" Yet that's not how the text reads. The Father raised Him to life through the power of the Holy Spirit. It's actually a beautiful picture of the Trinity. Consider a couple of passages that highlight this aspect:

"And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of his Spirit who lives in you." Romans 8:11

"Paul, an apostle—sent not from men nor by a man, but by Jesus Christ and <u>God the Father</u>, who raised him from the dead—" <u>Galatians 1:1</u>

When we take the time to appreciate this nuance—especially with Easter this Sunday—we can appreciate the second aspect of these passages, which is the incredible reality that God invites us to have the same experience! Paul writes in Corinthians that "By his power God raised the Lord from the dead, and he will raise us also" (1 Cor. 6:14).

If you choose to follow Jesus, the power that raised Him from the dead lives inside you right now to bring life. And this same power will also raise you to life after you physically die. What incredible truth we celebrate at Easter!

He Has Risen

Jesus did not come into this world to be served, although he is God and surely deserves it. He came to serve. He came to serve you. And through you, he wants to serve everyone you know.

After inviting us to sit back and enjoy being served by our wonderful God, Jesus says in the Gospel passage for the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper: "I have given you a model to follow -- what I have done for you, you should also do." His foot-washing ceremony is a model of service.

His model is very uncomfortable. It means loving others so much that we do good deeds for them, even for the people we dislike, those whose "**feet**" (behaviors, actions, the way they walk through life) are disgusting.

When we serve those who have not served us the way they should, we unite ourselves to Jesus by becoming Eucharist for them. What does it mean to "become Eucharist"?

First, we approach Christ in the Eucharist, and knowing that we are responsible for our own conversions, we tell him: "I am not worthy...." Then, after we receive him in the Eucharist, we return to our pews united to him. Communion means "with union." United to Christ, we are now as much the Eucharist as he is. At the end of Mass, we're commissioned to go out and be Eucharist -- be the real presence of Christ -- in the world.

Easter is not merely the end of Lent. Resurrection is not merely the end of an old life or old habits or an old problem that you've wanted to overcome. Easter is a season -- an unending season -- of joyfully running to others to share the Good News like those first evangelizers on that first Easter Sunday. The resurrection experience is a season of letting your faith be a source of joy for those who don't yet know the joy of having faith in the resurrected Jesus.



POPES

ST ELEUTHERIUS

The thirteenth Pope

174-189 A.D.

Pope St. Eleutherius was the last of the popes listed in St. Irenaeus' Adversus haeresis (Against heresy), since it was he who appointed St Irenaeus as bishop of Lyon, France

Greek by birth, the meaning of his name - "freeman" - suggests he might've been a freed slave. Eleutherius served as a deacon in Rome under his two predecessors, St. Anicetus & St. Soter, until being appointed pope himself in 174 AD.

He was first honored as a saint by the 9th Century hagiographer (aka "saint biography writer") Ado, and his feast day is celebrated May 26.

He was known mostly for battling the Montanist heresy and appointing St. Irenaeus to lead the Church in Lyon. Montanism - or "the New Prophecy" - was initially just a bit weird, rather than being outright heretical; Montanist prophets basically declared prophecies and ecstasies loudly, but without really teaching anything against the faith...at first.

As Montanism began to actually teach error, and since the Church was still technically illegal, Eleutherius couldn't just elbow the Roman sitting next to him and say, "Get a load o' these guys." Instead, he had to have a plan to both quiet them down and deal with the problem. Thankfully, Irenaeus volunteered as tribute to send a letter to churches being affected by the burgeoning heresy.


PRAYER OF CONSECRATION TO ST. JOSEPH
